## Section 4. First aid measures

### Description of necessary first aid measures

**Eye contact** Immediately flush eyes with plenty of water, occasionally lifting the upper and lower eyelids. Check for and remove any contact lenses. Continue to rinse for at least 10 minutes. # Section 7. Handling and storage

#### Precautions for safe handling
